There have been many times in the past few months when the words CHANGE and DISRUPTION have been placed before meetings of the Town Council and even the Town Assembly. It is very strange when we spend our lives striving for something better or to improve, but in getting to that point we all face some kind of change and disruption. Moving house and changing jobs are good examples, but in a similar way the Town Centre Regeneration Scheme is another prime example. On the one hand the Town Council receive complaints about the wide variety of tarmac, paving stones, cobbles and different materials used to repair the Market Place in particular, but when there is the chance to bring some kind of order to it, paid for with a once in a lifetime chance of Grant Funding, some still manage to criticise.

There is no doubt that Swaffham is facing a prolonged period of change and disruption, as work has just begun on the Town Hall Extension, and will move on to the Museum enhancement later this year. By the time you read this newsletter the Community Centre at Campinglands will be closed, it is soon to be demolished and rebuilt. Then at the end of the year the Assembly Rooms will close for refurbishment, add all of this together with work in the Town Centre. Many have expressed their opinion one way or the other on all these schemes and yet the major concern is all about what will happen during the time when the work is being carried out. It is pleasing to note that most people have now accepted that these projects are not a major conspiracy to make Swaffham look worse or really mess it up once and for all...

Each project needs to be finished as soon as possible, but in the meantime there are businesses to run, community groups to relocate and to keep going. It really won't be an easy period and everyone in the Town has an important part to play during this time. The Town still has to function, taking each day as it comes and dealing with problems as they occur. PLEASE try to help us get through it then we really can look to the future with confidence. Thank you in advance for your patience and understanding..

I am delighted to have the privilege to take on the position as Town Mayor for a second time and to have a deputy of the calibre of Jerome Stockdale. It promises to be a very exciting year with major building projects taking place throughout the Town. We have already made the first moves on the new health centre for Plowright Surgery and the Town Hall extension and look forward to the new Community Centre and the enhancement of the Assembly Rooms, the Museum and Hamond's High School.

Thanks to the Icen Partnership we have been able to gain extra funding and to hold public consultations on Norfolk County Council's plans for the Town Centre improvements. The views and suggestions put forward recently are currently being considered before the final scheme is presented. All of these improvements still leave us with a Swimming Pool to work for. SPA continues to fund-raise to add to the promises of the Town Council and Mr & Mrs Dennis and is contributing towards a feasibility study into the best site.

The Recreation Ground at Haspall's Road is also a subject for thought at the moment. We have the Skateboard Park which is still having the final touches for safety and security before the Town Council takes over. The young people are to be congratulated for gaining their first aid certificates and for doing their best to deal with unwanted litter. We now want ideas and opinions about the whole area.

There are many interesting activities planned in Swaffham over the Summer and I look forward to seeing many of you at these.

Underneath the Buttercross **SWAFFHAM TOWN COUNCIL**

The past three months have passed by and things are starting to move at last. And we are not talking about the bouncing up and down of the first bungee jump at the Swaffham Funday in May by the Deputy Town Clerk (really well done to Michelle by the way). We have movement on all the project fronts...read on..

TOWN HALL EXTENSION

Work has finally begun at the rear of the Town Hall on the long awaited extension. There has been a great deal of debate, discussion and varying opinions on the Town Hall. It is therefore good to see things starting on site. The contractors are Veltshaw Builders Ltd of Narborough. This project has been designed to fit the budget and hard negotiations have taken place to obtain the best value for money for the building. The extension should be finished in December, building works should take approximately 22 weeks, and will allow work to commence on the Museum in the latter part of the year. Every effort will be made to keep all Town Hall services going throughout the building programme, it is hoped that apart from when a few days are required to move into the new offices things should continue as normal as they can be under the circumstances.

COMMUNITY CENTRE

The Community Centre is due to close on 29th June and will be demolished at some point in the summer to allow a magnificent new building to be built. The building will accommodate all current users of the building who are being temporarily accommodated at the Eco-Tech business park whilst the work is carried out. The new Community Centre should be available for use in the summer of 2005. The Town Council are salvaging various bits and pieces from the old building including the existing wooden floor. This will be re-used in the public area of the Town Hall.

ASSEMBLY ROOMS

The Assembly Rooms will be closed at the end of December for the long overdue refurbishment. Details are being finalised for a much scaled down scheme than was originally envisaged. There are no offices or business suite, everything will be located on the ground floor. It will have a much larger public space, a functional kitchen, new toilets, an entrance to the building to allow access for everyone through the front door and many features of the old building will be retained, enhanced or refurbished. The building will be out of use for the whole of 2005.

TOWN CENTRE REGENERATION:

The big issue to come out of the consultation for Town Centre Improvements was the proposed loss of car parking. This matter has now been addressed and an amended scheme has taken account of all comments made. The net loss of parking has been reduced to just the illegal parking, all parking restrictions will be enforced. There was concern about the disruption during the programme of works and

Mott Macdonald have assured everyone that lessons have been learned from places like Downham Market, work will be carried out in much smaller bite size chunks to avoid chaos. This project has progressed from a highways maintenance budget that was added to by European funding to achieve a higher quality finish for our Town Centre. There has been concern expressed by Market Traders again mainly about what happens when the work is going on, whatever happens the Saturday Market will be going back in exactly the same place when it is all done and dusted.

FARMERS MARKET

Swaffham's first Farmers Market took place on April 7th and subsequently two more have followed in May and June respectively. Despite not attracting the best of the weather our first attempt at running a Farmers Market seems to be going along quite nicely. It is a different atmosphere to the Saturday Market and it does bring people to Swaffham on days when they don't normally come. The traders are pleased with the response so far and fears that this would take any trade away from any business in the town were unfounded. Many businesses have reported to the Town Hall that in fact on the day of the Farmers Market their trade increases.

RECREATION GROUND

The Council have a project sub-committee for the Recreation Ground who have started to put together their plans for the future. There is a consultation process going on at the present time, culminating in an open day at the Assembly Rooms on Saturday 3rd July. A competition has been organised in Swaffham's four schools to try and bring out the ideas from children of all ages of how they would like to see the Recreation Ground in the future. It is important that adults have their say too and in particular the residents in that area of the town. The sub-committee are looking for willing residents to join them. When all the ideas are finally taken account of, a project will be put together, fully costed out and presented to the full council for consideration. The Town Council have a match-funding budget and this project would be a prime candidate for this, in addition grants will be required and sought from a variety of organisations. It is hoped that whatever scheme is finally agreed upon will be implemented next year.

THE PEDLARS SIGN

It has been agreed by your Town Council to refurbish the Pedlars Sign in the Autumn. The sign still look fine from a distance, but up close it does look a bit shabby. Some of the wood is beginning to rot and it needs some major attention. Wayland Prison have built up a good reputation in recent years for their work on Town & Village Signs, they have now completed work on over 40 signs in the past five years. The Town Council believe that they will do a good job and therefore the sign will be dismantled and taken to the prison at the end of September for refurbishment. In return for carrying out this work the Council will have to make a donation to a charity of the Governors choice.

SKATEBOARD PROJECT – Haspall’s Road

This project has aroused many strong opinions for and against the Skateboard Park. The initial novelty value of something new increased the anti-social problem at the Recreation Ground. Concern has been expressed by residents living in the area and has been taken account of. Just as the skateboarders themselves have been taken account of, as those that want to use the facility properly should be allowed to do so. The associated problems are being dealt with and will continue to be dealt with until they are resolved. The Town Council have agreed in principle to provide CCTV cameras and security lighting at the Recreation Ground to tie in with other schemes in the Breckland District to allow the police the opportunity to monitor any problems and to react quickly. Side issues such as Breckland Council dealing with increased litter in the area on a daily basis. The SK8 Mob who recently held one of their meetings at the Town Hall is reporting vandalism or damaged equipment daily, some members also received their first aid certificate. It is important to build up confidence and trust in order to manage this new facility. By the time this newsletter reaches you the final adjustment works should be complete to allow a successful ROSPA inspection, the facility will then pass from the Icen Partnership to the Town Council for maintenance etc.

TWINNING

The plans are well advanced for the visit of our two twin towns Hemmoor and Couhe Verac over the weekend of 11th and 12th September. It will be a chance to catch up with some good friends from both towns. Hosts living in the town will accommodate a party of approximately 30 visitors from each town. The Twinning Association are always looking for local people who are prepared to act as hosts for this visit, please get in touch with Chairman Ben Emmerson on 720982 if you are interested. A full programme is being organised including a civic meeting between officials of all three towns, a civic function at Lynford Hall, a Twinning Association event at the Rugby Club and a Swaffham Michaelmas Fayre in the Market Place on the Sunday 12th September to include a Town Criers Competition hosted by our Town Crier Kerry Hart, a Farmers Market and a Swaffham Lions Pram Race more details will follow on this event, as this is designed to involve everyone in the town in order to share the cultural exchange and to show just what Swaffham can do.

THE BUS SHELTER

Just like the buses, you wait and wait for funding for one bus shelter, then you get funding for three all at once. A scheme is due to be presented to the Council at their July meeting for replacing the temporary shelter close to the Tourist Information Centre, also to improve the shelter on the other side of the road and provide a new shelter at Safeways Store (soon to be Waitrose).

NEW WEB SITE

The new web site is now on-line. You will find it at: www.swaffhamtowncouncil.co.uk The site is still under construction, as more features will be added throughout the year. But already you will find the last six copies of this newsletter, details of your councillors, some historical facts on the Town, details of clubs & societies, minutes and agendas, various reports, a gallery of events, some booking forms and frequently asked questions. The Council believe that a web site is an essential communication tool in order to remain as transparent as possible in their decision making.

THE BUDGET FOR 2004/05

The Precept was increased this year by £5,000 to £130,000 for the year 2004/05. A moderate increase compared with other councils of a similar size. The full budget was covered in great detail in the last edition of 'In Touch' and you will see a breakdown of some budget headings in the information circulated with your Council Tax bill. There has been a higher than average increase in a Band D property as the Council Tax base went down. This is the number of actual council taxpayers in the town. The Band D rate is now £55.37 whereas last year it was £50.52 an increase of £4.85 per year. The income derived from Swaffham's successful Saturday Market does help to subsidize the councils' precept requirements.

News on the Museum front in recent months has been all about what could happen or what might be happening in the future, but things are now changing as we prepare for our bigger and better Museum next year. We are at last moving forward and are delighted to announce the following:-

A new Museum Manager/Curator has been appointed by the Directors, starting work on Monday 21st June PHILIP SMITH brings the experience of being a volunteer in the Museum over the past three years, with a sharp learning curve over the past two years as voluntary administrator. He has already steered the Museum through a difficult period as others walked away and were eager to criticize. He was an integral part of putting together the funding package that will mean so much to the Museum in the next few years. Philip was chosen for many positive reasons and has earned the right to lead the Museum into this new and exciting venture. There were 25 application forms sent out, 13 high quality applications returned, six short-listed, five of which were finally interviewed for the post. It was fair to say that all applicants interviewed would have brought something different to the Museum. Philip has the utmost respect and support of everyone at the Town Hall & Museum, he has nothing to prove on that score, the Directors firmly believe that he will also go on to demonstrate to everyone that he will be an excellent Museum Manager/Curator.

The next appointment is the Education Officer which will be advertised shortly. The Museum is due to close on Sunday 12th September and the task set these two new employees is to oversee putting the collection and contents of the Museum into storage, then putting together the new displays in time for the July opening next year. Working behind the scenes to set down a solid foundation for the future, meeting the outputs for the grant funders, attending training events and generally getting things done for the benefit of the Museum.
